#### Fifth Annual Winter Conference, February 23-24, 2010, Hilton Springfield

This year's conference, entitled Digging Deeper: Using the Induction and Mentoring Continuum for Program Advancement, will give participants tools to assess program progress and to identify crucial areas of effective programs. The continuum document is based on the nine Illinois Standards of Quality and Effectiveness for Beginning Teacher Induction Programs and contains specific, progressive descriptions for exemplary programs. Conference participants will gain skill in using assessment tools and creating action plans for continual improvement.

The conference is open to anyone interested in induction and mentoring. We encourage administrators, mentors, program coordinators, and new teachers to attend as a team. Teams will have work and planning time scheduled during the conference.
