### **Message from the Director**

By now you have probably heard and/or read about the Advance Illinois/National Council on Teacher Quality study that is highly critical of teacher education in Illinois colleges and universities. Lost in all the heat is the important point that, although preservice teacher education is vitally important, its program graduates are still *novice* teachers. Regardless of the quality of their preservice preparation, they need effective induction and mentoring to jumpstart them toward being fully effective teachers. Our hope is that someday the transition from candidate to novice to seasoned/expert teacher will be seamless and fully supported by all our induction and mentoring partners.

We urge you to consider how you can advocate for furthering induction and mentoring efforts locally and statewide. Thanks to financial support from the Joyce Foundation, Tracy Kremer (Senior Manager of Communications, New Teacher Center) coordinated a collaborative initiative to create a one-page advocacy document encouraging statewide support for new teacher induction and mentoring (http://intc.education.illinois.edu/resource/rod/support-illinois-induction). This initiative involved a number of induction and mentoring partners and leaders from across the state. We hope you will distribute this flier or use portions of its content to increase awareness and support for induction in Illinois.

### **Executive Board and Partnership Board November Meeting Recap**

The INTC Executive and Partnership Boards (EB/PB) met jointly on November 3<sup>rd</sup> at the I Hotel and Conference Center in Champaign, Illinois. At the meeting, participants heard reports from INTC Work Groups and research reports from Marjorie Wechsler of SRI International and Patricia Brady of INTC. Additionally, induction and mentoring stakeholders participated in strategic plan activities aimed at reconnecting INTC's statewide efforts with those present. INTC staff will take the ideas raised at the EB/PB meeting and incorporate them into its mission to coordinate services and resources through its statewide partnerships.

# **ISBE Funded Programs**

Funded programs have had budgets approved for FY11. INTC will continue to offer support and services for all funded programs, including the 15 that were unable to apply for FY11 funds due to the impact of reduced funding.

The fall Professional Learning and Networking (PLaN) meetings were held in October and November at five locations. Tracy Kremer, mentioned above, presented a workshop on communication and advocacy. ## **Regional Professional Development Workshops**

INTC hosted fall Regional Professional Development Workshops on differentiated instruction at three locations (Edwards, Lisle, and Centralia) in September and October. These workshops, offered at no cost, were attended by new teachers and those who work with them. Teachers from Litchfield Middle School presented in Edwards and Centralia, and a recently retired teacher from Chicago Public School District #299 presented in Lisle.

## Illinois Induction Program Continuum (IIPC)

Four Continuous Program Improvement workshops will be held in January and February. The workshops focus on program self assessment, data analysis, and use of the continuum to set goals and create action plans. The workshop facilitators have formed a professional learning cadre and have met online to discuss their work and provide support for the trainings. ### **Service Learning for New Teachers**
